Transitional Housing for Offender Re-Entry (THOR) Directory and Re-Entry Partnership Housing (RPH)

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RE-ENTRY PARTNERSHIP HOUSING

- Collaboration between the Department of Community Supervision and the Department of Community Affairs
- Works with a network of 28 pre-approved housing providers throughout Georgia
- Provides housing assistance to Problem Residence Inmates

WHO ARE PROBLEM RESIDENCE INMATES?

- Inmates who have reached their Tentative Parole Month (TPM) but do not have a valid residence
- Must have a clean disciplinary record, no pending charges, and no severe mental health issues
- Inmates are offered housing under the RPH program, which pays \$600 per months for their first three months' rent and food

RE-ENTRY PARTNERSHIP HOUSING

- Allows inmates who would otherwise max out their sentences to be released
- Frees up beds for Department of Corrections, allows halfway houses to receive compensation, and saves the state money in supervision costs
- Cost per day to supervise a parolee: \$4.32
- Cost per day to house an inmate: \$51.19

RE-ENTRY PARTNERSHIP HOUSING

- ❖ From FY2011 FY2014, RPH has saved the state \$30.6 million in supervision costs
- RPH only pays for housing and food
- Housing providers can be faith-based or secular. Faith-based activities/services must be optional for RPH placements

RE-ENTRY PARTNERSHIP HOUSING & MENTAL HEALTH

- For inmates with moderate mental illnesses (Mental Health level 3), RPH pays \$675 per month for 4 months
- ❖ \$675 = the approximate amount of an SSI check
- ❖ Average amount of time for disability benefits to be secured in GA = 118 days

LIMITATIONS

- * Registrable sex offenders are not eligible for funding
 - Most housing providers will not accept them
 - Providers who would otherwise accept them cannot due to 1000-foot restrictions
 - Creates a public safety issue if the parolee cannot find employment within 90 days and has no other support
- Mental health level 4 and above are not eligible, as they need highly specialized care, not just housing and food

LIMITATIONS

- Probationers became eligible as of July 1, 2015
- Max-outs (those without any parole or probation supervision upon release) are not eligible

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

HOW DO I APPLY?

We are currently accepting applications on a case-bycase basis.

Information on the application process is available at http://pap.georgia.gov/reentry-partnership-housingrph – applications are accepted on a case-by-case basis. The site has downloads for the RPH Guidelines and application forms.

HOW DO I APPLY?

- ❖ Applications are first reviewed by the Department of Community Supervision and then sent to DCA for approval
- Once DCA approves, a site visit is scheduled
- Once the physical inspection is passed, the housing provider signs a contract and is then able to receive placements through the RPH program

HOW DO I RECEIVE PLACEMENTS?

- The RPH staff will maintain constant communication with you regarding vacancies
- When an inmate is placed with you, you will be notified via e-mail one week prior. You will be expected to pick up the individual at the bus station
- * RPH staff may also contact you regarding individuals who have already been released from prison

HOW DO I PROVIDE MEALS TO RPH PLACEMENTS?

- Provide \$50 per week to each individual and allowing them to do their own shopping, OR
- Providing groceries and allowing them to prepare their own meals, OR
- Providing two meals per day

ARE INDIVIDUALS REQUIRED TO STAY FOR THE FULL 90 DAYS?

No.

If an individual's supervision officer approves, they may move out before the 90 days are complete.

WHAT DO I DO IF AN RPH PLACEMENT BREAKS THE RULES OF MY PROGRAM?

- If it is an emergency, call the police
- ❖ You may ask an RPH placement to leave your program if they don't abide by the rules. Make sure to notify his or her supervision officer

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER 90 DAYS?

- You can allow the option for an individual to continue to stay with you and pay rent
- You are not obligated to house someone past 90 days
- Their supervision officers should provide assistance with obtaining housing once the 90 days are over

HOW WILL I BE COMPENSATED?

- Once you have received a placement, you will notify RPH staff and an invoice will be sent to you to sign and return to us
- Signed invoices are sent to DCA to processing
- DCA has up to one month to process the invoices

HOW WILL I BE COMPENSATED?

- ❖ If an individual's release is cancelled, housing providers are compensated \$300.
- ❖ If an individual is released but is a no-show at the bus station, housing providers are compensated \$600.

CAN THE RPH PROGRAM GUARANTEE THAT ALL OF MY BEDS ARE KEPT FULL?

No.

RPH does not guarantee any number of placements to any housing provider.

DO I HAVE TO USE ALL OF THE BEDS IN MY FACILITY FOR RPH?

No.

You can use as many or as few beds as you wish for RPH purposes.

WHAT REQUIREMENTS DOES MY FACILITY NEED TO MEET?
