Referral process

- Vnit Management Chief / designee makes referral to RHO Provider via email
- > RHO Provider responds with vacancy information
- Information is shared
- > Interview
- Date set for admission
- Transportation




Returning Home Ohio - Research Results



60% less likely to recidivate back to prison




Returning Home Ohio - Research Results
